INSTRUCTIONS ON BACK

Count to 10.	Sort toys by size, (big and little), color, or shape.	Walk and read the Westside Park StoryWalk®.	Sort socks with your child.	Tell the story of Little Red Riding Hood.*
Sing a nursery rhyme. Do the suggested activity.*	Read a story together.	Clap the syllables in a song as you sing with your child.	Give your child a blank piece of paper and a crayon or pencil and let them scribble away!	Read a story with your child.
Read a story and let your child turn the pages.	Try a new fruit or vegetable and talk about its texture, color, taste, etc.	Play with play dough.*	Read a story together.	Sing a song and change the sounds. (Example: Dock-arye gaby, in the free-sop)
Read a story together.	Put on some music and dance!	Build with blocks.	Read while running your finger under the words as you say them.	Let your child smell spices and herbs when you are cooking. Describe the smells (grassy, warm, spicy, etc.)

NO COOK PLAY DOUGH RECIPE

- ♦ 2 cups plain flour
- ♦ 1 cup salt
- ♦ 1 t oil
- ♦ 1/2 to 1 cup cold water
- ◊ 2 drops liquid food coloring

Combine plain flour and salt. Add water, food coloring and oil. Mix until ingredients are combined. Knead well. If consistency is too wet add a little plain flour.

PUZZLES

There are puzzles in the children's area to put together while you are at the library. The library also has children's puzzles to check out and put together at home.

FINGER-PAINT RECIPE

- ♦ 2 cups corn starch
- ♦ 1 cup cold water
- ♦ 4.5 cups boiling water
- ♦ Liquid food coloring

Mix the corn starch with the cold water and stir together. Pour in the boiling water a cup at a time and stir between each cup. It goes really strange (you are basically mixing a hot oobleck goop) but keep stirring and eventually it will seem to "melt" into a wonderful, custard-like consistency. Portion out into small jars or bowls and add color. If the paint doesn't thicken up, try adding corn starch a little at a time (up to 1 cup). You may also try mixing it over medium heat to help bring it together.
