Bingo Instructions

Fill the card to get a goody bag and free book for your child!

- **PLAY “SAND” RECIPE**

- ◇ 4 cups **whole-wheat** flour (Not white or “white” whole wheat. Brown whole wheat is what makes it really look and feel like sand from the beach)
- ◇ 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- ◇ Mix well. It has the consistency of damp beach sand, without being sticky or wet. It has a light brown color, too, which makes it look even more like sand.

- **FINGER-PAINT RECIPE**

- ◇ 2 cups of corn starch
- ◇ 1 cup of cold water
- ◇ 4.5 cups of boiling water
- ◇ Liquid food coloring

Mix the corn starch with the cold water and stir together. Pour in the boiling water a cup at a time and stir between each cup. It goes really strange (you are basically mixing a hot oobleck goop) but keep stirring and eventually it will seem to “melt” into a wonderful, custard-like consistency. Portion out into small jars or bowls and add color. If the paint doesn’t thicken up, try adding corn starch a little at a time (up to 1 cup). You may also try mixing it over medium heat to help bring it together.

- **BLOCKS**

Blocks may be borrowed for in-library use at the front desk. (May be a choking hazard for children under 2. Use at your discretion.)

- **PUZZLES**

Age appropriate puzzles may be found in the Children’s Area of the library. They may not be checked out, but feel free to use them in the library.
